Hello,

Summer is over. What a season of extremes we've had! After one of the most severe spring floods, we now have one of the lowest water levels ever. In fact, there is a 218-cm or 7.15-foot difference between May and October. At least July and August were good, and we hope you enjoyed them. We invite you to view the lake water level on the Website. Such a difference is extraordinary.

For our part, we have been very active throughout the summer. This issue of the Remous summarizes our activities in the past few months and the main issues will be working on this winter.

SURVEY 2019

First of all, thank you all for your participation. Some 190 participants took the time to complete the questionnaire. This is a very representative sample when we consider that polling firms make national predictions with a participation rate of less than 1%. In our case, with a 58% participation rate, we have a clear picture of what you think. The survey results are posted on the website under Members Survey. Thank you to all the Board members and especially to Marc Dumouchel for his outstanding work that has provided us with guidelines for the future.

We will not present all of the details here, but we can tell you about some of the main trends that have been identified:

a) People are spending longer periods at the lake. More and more people use their cottages in winter. The number of permanent residents is increasing and 30% of respondents intend to become permanent residents when they retire.

- This is a major change that will inevitably have an impact on the services to be provided by the Municipality.
- b) People have the same goal when they come to the lake, they want peace and quiet and to enjoy what the lake has to offer. They are not in favour of development, either on the South Beach or in other locations around the lake. They consider the quality of the environment to be good or fairly stable, but are beginning to have concerns about new issues such as invasive plants, mine exploration and the effect of wake boats.
- c) Owners are generally satisfied with the municipality's services and even more so with those of the APLG. Thank you for your confidence. With the survey results and the cross-references that we will be able to make depending on areas of the lake and, especially, your many comments, we believe we will be able to further define our areas of activity for the coming years.

We have a meeting scheduled in October with the Municipal Council to share these results with them and ensure that they too understand what you are looking for and that they are better informed to meet the challenges of the future.

MINING

You may have seen or heard about the issue in the media this summer, but a lot has been happening since. What began as a concern related to an exploration project near the lake evolved when the number of mining claims across the Regional County Municipality (RCM) became apparent. We invite you to consult the claims map that has been published on the web page.

The Regroupement de Protection des Lacs de la Petite-Nation is currently in a support building campaign. We have published an information package, which includes a resolution that calls for a ban on mining activity in the northern part of the RCM. To date, we are pleased to have the support of the Municipal Councils of Duhamel, Lac Simon, Chénéville, Ripon and Montpellier. We are continuing this campaign with several organizations in the region, and expect answers soon.

We have also presented our information package to the RCM Council of Mayors and we will have a meeting in the next few days with the RCM Prefect, representatives of the planning committee and the Minister responsible for the Outaouais region. So far, we have had positive results from our efforts regarding this issue, which started with Lac Gagnon and has now been expanding to other municipalities in the region. You will be hearing about it again in the near future.

DUHAMEL EN COULEURS, OCTOBER 12, 2019

As part of the <u>Duhamel en couleurs</u> to be held on October 12th in the Route des Zingues, where some 150 people are expected, the APLG has decided, with the support of the municipality of Duhamel, to take this opportunity to support the municipality of Grenvillesur-la-Rouge, which is facing a massive lawsuit from a mining developer. Volunteers will be collecting donations from participants and the Municipality of Duhamel will match donations received up to a maximum of \$500. Grenville-sur-la-Rouge may also issue tax receipts for amounts of \$20 or more.

This is a great opportunity to celebrate our beautiful region in a spirit of friendship and solidarity.

INVASIVE PLANTS

In 2017, we were pleased to learn that there was no milfoil in our lake. However, we have to remain vigilant, since it is in surrounding lakes. We recently visited lac des Plages, which has been severely impacted by milfoil and we can assure you that you do not want it to spread to our lake.

Since this plant is mainly spread by water craft, we are looking at the various options for better management of the boat launches at the lake. This is on the agenda for our next meeting with the Municipal Council and we will be urging them to have an awareness campaign, information boards and clear rules by next spring. This is a top priority for the Board of Directors.
