SHORELINE RESTORATION



The APLG, the municipality of Duhamel and Ferme HLF from Lac-Simon are working together to help you restore your shoreline.

Date: May 26, 2007

Objective: Give you an opportunity to participate in a planting initiative to restore the natural condition of the shoreline.

Project:

During the first year, five landscaping plans will be implemented. The organizing committee will help the people selected for the pilot project.

We're hoping to combine work and pleasure.

The teams will travel by pontoon and bring shovels, rakes, gloves, etc.

The organizing team will take care of the plants and refreshments.

We will try to get most of the work done in the morning and participants are invited to a picnic organized by the APLG.

Eligibility:

- Be a member of APLG
- Be prepared to start or continue the restoration of your shoreline (within 15 m. of the shore)
- Submit a plan and/or send a picture of your shoreline to the project manager so you can work together to determine the appropriate plants and shrubs to plant
- Define the sites (wet or dry), hours of sunlight and desired height
- Agree to work with the planting team on the five projects, since this is a group effort

Cost: Ferme HLF is offering its expertise, advice and the plants.

The municipality will cover 35% of the cost of the plants ordered. You will therefore need to cover the balance.

N.B: Our intention is not to carry out major projects. We want to help you start or continue a shoreline restoration project.

We don't want to demolish anything, we are not passing judgement. Our intention is to carry out a low-maintenance, long-term project.

FISHING SEASON

Fishing season is just around the corner. In fact, trout fishing starts on Friday, April 27.

Last fall, the ACPTA stocked speckled trout in the following lakes: Gagnon, Lafontaine, Iroquois, Petit Preston, de la Ferme, Blanc, Hughes and Elmitt. Bourgeois and Saint-Ange lakes were stocked with rainbow trout.

Stocking activities are financed through member dues. Annual ACPTA membership cards, at a cost of \$15 per family, are available at Duhamel stores.

At the start of the season, you should fish on the surface, near sandy shorelines, using a streamer, a 2-oz lead weight (optional) and about 150 feet of line. Fish stay near the surface right after the ice disappears.

For more information and tips, contact Roger lppersiel, an experienced fisherman who knows this area very well. He might even tell you how he caught that big brown trout. Roger's number is 819-427-5041.

BILL OF HEALH

PROTECTING OUR LAKE!

More and more people are dreaming of their golden retirement, in the country, preferably by a lake.

We find ourselves in an unprecedented situation as a result of pressures from developers. Development is increasing and few areas will remain untouched. It seems the road network is adjusting to this demand.

Just think of what is planned at Tremblant: 9,000 to 12,000 new units in the next year (Versant Sud, Versant Soleil, Camp Nord) or the project on Lac Ouareau, in St. Donat, with an 87-unit hotel, 28 garden residences and 36 villas on the shore of the lake.

We have to think about the future, because development will have an impact on our bodies of water and our way of life. How can we prevent projects from encroaching on sensitive zones? Is it possible to define a protection rating or index? What is the limit of our environmental fragility?

A new approach, involving management of the drainage basin, consists in following the movement of water where it starts, at the mountain top, and seems to be an excellent way to build awareness and protect the environment. This approach takes account of all activities that have an impact on water resources with the objective of reaching all parties and users that have an effect on the environment.

In our region, the main players are elected municipal officials, waterfront property owners, forestry operators, fishers, hunters, campground operators, sports clubs, associations, and local development centres. The time has come to move away from our traditional management approach with its limited tools and adopt a partnership approach calling for greater involvement from all parties.

WHAT'S IN STORE FOR 2007?

You will find below a summary of the municipality's action plan resulting from the survey and consultations at city hall last summer.

Revitalizing the village: the entrance into the village will be improved, a pedestrian zone and parking area will be set up and a map or billboard with municipal activities and attractions will be erected.

Ecotourism: the municipality would like to create multipurpose trails. Work has begun on a hiking trail around Lac de la Ferme. A trail to Mont Caroline is planned. Iroquois Brook will be developed. A portion of the heritage trail could come through our region.

Corporation Récréotouristique et Économique de Duhamel (CRED) is involved in these activities.

Water safety regulations and motorsport guidance: Committees have been set up and are preparing a code of ethics for water craft users and regulations for motor vehicle operators.

Environment: This critical issue will be a priority. Numerous projects will be initiated as a result of hiring the Environment Coordinator, Julie Ricard.
